CALVARY GIVES OVER \$90,000 IN OUTREACH GRANTS

Each year, the Outreach Grant Committee reviews funding requests from local non-profit organizations and Calvary ministries. This year Bonnie Binkley, Lucia Crenshaw, Jamey Howdeshell, Harriett McFadden, Nicole Seltzer and Jane Slatery worked with the Rev. Ellen Roberds, the Rev. Phillip Wiehe and myself to revise the grant criteria and allocate approximately \$100,000. This year, we are pleased to announce the following gifts to local non-profit organizations that further our mission of “making God’s love visible in downtown Memphis.”



Members of BRIDGES Bridge Builders program

BRIDGES builds leaders to advance racial, economic, education and environmental justice. It will use the \$7,500 grant from Calvary to fund its Bridge Builders program by providing scholarships to high school students from low-income families.

Carnes Elementary School is Calvary’s adopted public school located in Memphis Medical District. Each year,

Calvary has awarded Carnes a small grant to enhance the learning environment for its students. This year the school requested \$5,000 for reading tablets and e-books.

The Church Health Center is a healthcare ministry located in midtown Memphis which seeks to respond to the biblical and historical commitment of the Church to care for the poor and the sick. Their ministries provide affordable, quality healthcare for the working uninsured and their families, and promote healthy bodies and spirits for all. The Church Health Center was awarded

BISHOP LARRY MAZE
TO VISIT CALVARY ON MAY 6



In the Episcopal Church it is understood that the bishop will visit every church in the diocese yearly. Some dioceses are so large that an assisting bishop will need to help with the annual visits, and sometimes the bishop is on a sabbatical leave and another bishop is needed to fill in. That is

the case for us at Calvary as Bishop Larry Maze, retired Bishop of Arkansas, will be visiting on Sunday, May 6, at the 10:30 a.m. service.

Over his 34 years of ordained leadership Bishop Maze served as a school chaplain, the Vicar of a small mission, the rector of three parishes, and finally as the Bishop of Arkansas. He is currently the Bishop-in-Residence at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Little Rock.

As part of the annual visit, it is customary for the bishop to confirm young adults and others who are renewing the baptismal vows made on their behalf when they were infants or children. There is also a simple ritual for welcoming into the Episcopal Church those baptized in another tradition; and, since these two liturgies are about baptism, we also offer the sacrament of baptism at the same service. ASCENSION DAY WORSHIP

The Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord, also known as Ascension Thursday or Ascension Day, is one of the great feast days in the Christian liturgical calendar and commemorates the bodily ascension of Jesus into heaven. Ascension Day is traditionally celebrated on a Thursday, the fortieth day of Easter.

Calvary will celebrate this feast day on Thursday, May 17, with a Choral Eucharist beginning at 7:00 p.m. The Schola of Calvary Choir will offer music by Edgar Bainton (*And I saw a new heaven*), Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina (*Ascendit Deus*) and Thomas Tallis (*O sacrum convivium*). The service music will be by Tomás Luis de Victoria, from his mass *Ascendens Christus in altum*.

Come celebrate this feast day with beautiful music in a church filled with magnificent and powerful icons.

Although she was resuscitated by medical technicians repeatedly over the next several hours, and died in the presence of family, the experience for many of us on the staff was variously profound and traumatic. I will say more about this in the next month or so, but the important thing to remember is the remarkable way Mary-Knox touched so many in the Calvary community in her six years with us. Please keep her extended family, including the Calvary staff in your prayers.

\$15,000 for its Days of Giving program, which provides medical services for individuals who can't afford healthcare.

The Community Legal Center was awarded a grant of \$5,000 to provide legal services to people of limited means who fall within the jurisdiction of the courts located in Memphis and Shelby County and to educate them as to their rights and responsibilities under the law.

Emmanuel Episcopal Center educates and empowers at-risk youth and adults through Christian ministry so that they are elevated out of poverty and become productive citizens. The Center was awarded \$7,500 in general operating support and to fund the Youth-N-Action program and Camp H.O.P.E. (Helping Our Participants Excel).

Friends for Life helps people affected by HIV/AIDS live well. Their grant of \$5,000 will be used to provide nutritious food to 425 dependent children living with an adult who has HIV/AIDS.

Hope House was established in 1994 by the Junior League of Memphis in response to the needs for quality preschool services for children and families impacted by HIV and AIDS in the Memphis area. Hope House requested \$5,000 for a new economic stability program called "Getting Ahead in a Just-Gettin'-By World," which teaches course participants about setting economic goals, achieving those goals, and climbing out of poverty.

MIFA was awarded an unrestricted gift of \$15,000 to engage the community to sustain the independence of seniors, transform the lives of families in crisis, and equip teens for success.

The Samaritan Counseling Center will use Calvary's grant of \$15,000 provide healing to those seeking a balance of emotional, relational and spiritual health. The Samaritan

Centers respond to the psychological and spiritual needs of individuals, families, couples and groups by providing counseling and crisis intervention services in an environment of compassion and confidentiality.

The Committee also allocated funds to two important Calvary ministries. The Community Breakfast and the Hospitality HUB. **The Community Breakfast** was awarded \$5,000 to offer a welcoming blessing, a wholesome breakfast, and needed clothing and toiletries to 200-225 persons in need in downtown Memphis each Sunday morning. **The HUB** has been awarded \$5,000

in addition to \$25,000 provided through Calvary's operating budget to further its mission to connect homeless people with the resources they need to begin their journey out of homelessness.

The committee has additional grant funds that will be allocated over the next few months. This includes \$2,000 to support a project identified by our youth groups. As we allocate the remaining funds, the committee also will work with the youth groups and Outreach to develop volunteer opportunities with all of the funded organizations. We hope that as we develop and communicate new volunteer opportunities, Calvary's parishioners will take a more active role in furthering the missions of these vital organizations. Bo is the Senior Pastor of our neighbor church, First Presbyterian, on Poplar at Third St. Bo and First Presbyterian have been engaged in street ministry on their own and in partnership with Calvary for many years. MINISTRIES AS GIFTS TO THE CITY

Dear Friends,

As I look back over the previous two months from Ash Wednesday through Easter and the installation of *Icons in Transformation*, I am genuinely amazed at the amount of energy that many of you have produced for ministry at Calvary.

The Waffle Shop required about 3,000 hours of volunteer time to cover the dining room, of which Calvary members provided about 600 hours. Over 6,000 lunches were served which makes for a lot of aspic. In the kitchen Bill Webster and Mary O'Brien supervised a paid staff that included workers recruited through a job placement program at the HUB. Doug Franklin supervised kitchen volunteers ensuring that waffles and chicken salad were always available. And Elizabeth Madden and Desi Franklin worked to oversee the Dessert room, one of the most tempting places in the Waffle Shop!

Others gave of their time to serve as ushers and greeters for the Lenten Preaching Series and several of you served as shepherds for the speakers who came from out of town. It is clear that both the Lenten

Preaching Series and the Waffle Shop will continue to be important among our gifts to the city.

The Easter Vigil alone required over forty people in order to make it the excellent event that summarizes the spiritual life of Calvary. From the choirs to the readers to the bell banner bearers, everyone gave their best. Many Eucharistic Ministers, ushers and musicians made our Easter Day services special. I took special delight in being able to join with congregations from St. Peter Roman Catholic and Trinity Lutheran for the first part of the Vigil.

Amazingly, the day after the Easter services, about a dozen staff and volunteers gathered to do much of the installation of *Icons in Transformation*. I especially want to recognize David Lusk, Carissa Hussong and their daughters Phoebe and Grayson who arrived early and stayed late. Jill Piper and Pat Vescovo assembled the wonderful party that opened the exhibit and Lucia Crenshaw has for several months managed the mounting of the exhibit.

There are many more who have helped with all of these gifts to the city, and I thank you for making this important part of our ministries possible.

WORK ON CALVARY'S BELL TOWER CONTINUES

Work is proceeding on the bell tower on schedule. The first steps include dismantling the uppermost portion of the tower and storing all of the bricks that can be reused. There is also work being done on the inside of the tower removing the stucco coating that is similar to that which was used to cover the outside of the tower and the church.

Some of the bricks are sufficiently damaged by weather or have cracks that cannot be repaired and must be discarded. Consequently, the contractor, SWR, will be purchasing bricks that have come from the demolition of buildings in Memphis. The expectation is that there will be enough bricks that are original to the tower to cope with needed replacements on the exterior. Bricks from other sources will be used only on the inside of the tower.

If the restoration project continues on schedule, work should be finished by the end of June. A rededication of the tower is tentatively scheduled for Sunday, August 6, Calvary's 180th birthday!
